

Dear Friends.

At the end of the month, on October [29], we will celebrate Reformation Sunday. This is the Sunday we celebrate Martin Luther's bold action of standing up to the abusive practices of the Roman Catholic Church by nailing his infamous "95 Theses" to the chapel door at the University of Wittenberg. (You can read them at this website if you'd like: www.iclnet.org/pub/resources/text/wittenberg/luther/web/ninetyfive.html) Luther didn't intend to start a Reformation movement, but as a result of this, he was condemned and excommunicated.

During this Reformation month, I thought it might be a good idea to review why we do what we

do at Northminster in worship... In brief, here is an explanation of Presbyterian worship as we do it!

The **Prelude**, referred to by some as the "Opening Voluntary," is a prayer of preparation offered by the musician on our behalf. During the Prelude, I encourage you to prepare for worship. The announcement slides let you know what is going on in the life of our church, and after you have read them, use the time to quiet to heart and mind and focus on God.

We begin our worship by singing **Songs of Praise**. These songs tend to be more upbeat, and are indeed songs instead of hymns. Many like to stand during this time of sung worship. Let these songs become your prayer to God, offering God your praise.



From the Pastor continued

The Call to Worship is a call to the faithful to enter fully into worship, to seek God in the coming hour.

At Northminster, we generally sing three **Hymns**, either from the hardcover *Presbyterian Hymnal* or from the softcover Sing the Faith. Each of the hymns is carefully chosen by Dana and I to enhance our worship experience: each of the hymns reflects the overall emphasis of the day's worship service. Because of this, you may not get to sing your "old favorites," and you may be introduced to something new. Perhaps that new hymn, in time, will become an "old favorite!"

The Prayer of Confession is a time to acknowledge that we are sinners in need of God's grace, and the **Assurance of Pardon** reminds us that we are, indeed, forgiven! We follow the assurance of pardon with a Gloria, singing to the glory of God in thanksgiving for all that God has done.

The choir will usually sing an Anthem, a musical piece often consisting of a setting of Scripture. The Anthem allows the hearers to experience the power of

Scripture readings, of course, are central to the worship experience. We hear the Word of God read aloud, listening for new ways in which it may touch us. Throughout most of the year, I follow the Revised Common Lectionary, a three-year cycle of Scripture readings that include a reading from the Old Testament (or "Hebrew Scriptures"), a Psalm reading, an epistle reading and a gospel lesson. I usually choose two of these to read on a given Sunday, and my sermon is guided by those readings.

The **Sermon** is an exposition or explanation of the Scriptures. Some preachers preach sermons based on "timely topics," such as abortion or global climate change or marriage and so on, and they choose Scripture readings to support their conclusions. I start with the Scripture readings, and let them speak to me through the Holy Spirit as I craft a sermon that will be meaningful and useful to you. Sometimes, you may feel that I didn't touch you. That happens! Hopefully another sermon will speak to you.

The **Offering** is the opportunity for you to participate directly in the act of worship as you give of yourself: your money, your gifts, your very selves. Even if you don't place a tithe or offering in the plate, you can still use this time to give your life to God each week. Musicians offer their abilities to God during the offering.

At Northminster, we share a special way in the **Morning Prayers**, as those who feel led come forward, light a candle and share their joys and concerns with the congregation. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to hear directly from our brothers and sisters in Christ. I remind you, though, that we need to hear your requests. Please, when you speak on the microphone, hold it near the top so your hand doesn't cover the antennae, and speak clearly and fairly loudly. The microphone only amplifies what it picks up, so if you don't speak clearly,

all it can do is amplify a mumble. A good guideline to remember when speaking with a microphone—speak as if there isn't one. Then the microphone can do its job and allow us all to pray with you.

Following a closing hymn, you receive a Blessing, or **Benediction**. This is quite an honor for me as I pass on the blessings of God as we go out into the world to continue serving God.

Finally, I want to mention a word about applause in church. When a musician sings, or plays an instrument, she or he is doing so as an offering to God. Applause is, of course, appropriate and expected at a concert, but in worship it can be distracting, and seems to make worship a concert instead of a way of honoring God. If you feel that a song is especially well done, an "Amen" or a simple thank you after the service is wonderful. Soren Kierkegaard compared worship to a theater, but a theater in reverse: The congregation is the actors, the worship leaders are the prompters, and God is the audience. Therefore, it is God's applause that we seek...

Marguerite was honored in a service at Northminster, where her love, faith and devotion to God and family was remembered.
